2020 Enrollment

4HOnline opened October 1 for families to re-enroll current 4-H members and enroll new 4-H members for the 2020 4-H year. We ask that all current 4-H members be re-enrolled by November 1, 2019. The website for 4HOnline is https://ks.4honline.com.

As a reminder the \$15 program fee will be paid at the time of enrollment within 4HOnline. (Adult volunteers and Cloverbuds will not be charged the fee.) 4-H Financial Audit Due November 1

4-H Treasurers, Club Leaders, and Financial Review Committee members: the annual 4-H Club Financial Audit is required for all non-appropriated funds generated for Extension programs. This includes funds raised/collected by 4-H clubs, project clubs, affiliated groups, etc. The Annual Financial Report document can be found on the Leader Resources page at www.johnson.k-state.edu/4-h/project-club-resources/club-leader-resources/. Every club/ group who has an EIN number issued by the IRS is asked to have a Financial Review Committee review the club financial records annually. Members of this committee should NOT be family members of the treasurer or signatories on the account. The committee should be composed of two 4-H members and two adult volunteers. This information is due to the Extension office by November 1, 2019. NEW REQUIREMENT: The Treasurer's Book MUST be submitted from every group with an EIN. Please review Ami's email regarding the requirement or contact Ami with any questions.

4-H Shooting Sports Fall State Match Results

Johnson County had strong performances again this year at 4-H Shooting Sports Fall State Matches. Individuals placed in different categories within each discipline. Our county brought home a good number of awards, but following is a report of overall aggregate results given to top 5 places, and team places for the top 3 teams.

The first weekend was the State Archery match. In Senior Barebow: Becca (Great Plains) -2^{nd} , Abby (Lucky Clover) -4^{th} . Barebow team of Becca and Abby -1^{st} . In Junior Olympic: Landon (Country Hearts) -1^{st} , Josiah (Great Plains) -3^{rd} . In Senior Olympic: Conner (Comet Tech) -2^{nd} . Olympic team of Conner and Jennifer (Frontier Family) -1^{st} . Junior Open Compound: Michael (Blue River Wranglers) -3^{rd} . In addition, 16 more individual category placings were awarded to our county.

The second weekend was State Smallbore Rifle, Smallbore Pistol, Muzzle Loader, and Hunting Skills matches. In Smallbore Rifle: Chase (Morning Glory) – 4^{th} . Rifle team of Chase and Ben (Morning Glory) – 2^{nd} . Two more placings were awarded to our county. In Smallbore Pistol: Chase – 1^{st} , Abby – 2^{nd} . Pistol team of Chase and Abby – 1^{st} . Chase won the "Top Shot" hat. Three more placings were awarded to our county. In Muzzle Loader: Ben – 1^{st} . Muzzle Loader team of Ben and Jacob (Livestock Club) – 2^{nd} . Ben won the "Top Shot" hat. Two more placings were awarded to our county.

The last weekend was the State Shotgun match. We didn't have overall aggregate placings, but Evan and Ann'adele (both Country Hearts) placed in Junior Trap.

YQCA Requirement for 2020 Johnson County Fair

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal wellbeing, and character development, through age-appropriate educational curriculum for youth 8-21 years of age. This program is an annual certification that grows with a young person, so the learning modules are different every year.

All livestock exhibitors are required to be YQCA certified in order to participate in the Johnson County Fair, Kansas State Fair Grand Drive, and/or Kansas Junior Livestock Show. Be sure to plan ahead so that all 4-H'ers have plenty of time to get certified! Certification can be done by taking a minimum one-hour in-person training or an online training. Both trainings are registered for and paid for by going to www.YQCA.org and logging into the system through 4HOnline. All registration and payment is handled through the YQCA website and must be done before attending either type of training. The online training is \$12 per youth and the in-person training is \$3 per youth. Dates for in-person trainings in Johnson County will be announced soon. Grants Available for Johnson County 4-H Projects

Johnson County 4-H will again this year be offering Project Leader Grants for project leaders or volunteers interested in leading a countywide project! The purpose of this grant is to offer project meetings to 4-H'ers who would otherwise not have an opportunity to learn about the project, to increase participation in projects 4-H'ers are already enrolled in and increase overall enrollment in projects. If awarded, the project leader would receive an amount of up to \$100. Grant money will be used to cover the cost of materials so that 4-H'ers can participate in the project with little to no cost. It could also cover admission to educational exhibits. 

Kansas State Fair Dog Show 2019

The Kansas State Fair Dog Show was on Saturday, September 14th this year. It was held at the Kansas State fairgrounds in Hutchinson, Ks. The show started at 9 a.m. with the vet check starting at 8 a.m. There were 4-H members from all over the state signed up for the day's events.

Ring 2: Started with 4 heats of Junior Showmanship, 1 heat of Intermediate Showmanship, and Rally-O II.

Ring 3: Had 5 heats of Intermediate Showmanship.

Ring 4: Had 5 heats of Senior Showmanship, Novice Obedience, and Rally-O III.

Ring 5: Had Utility B Obedience, Open A & B Obedience, Graduate Novice Obedience, and Novice Obedience.

There were 3 contestants in Utility B Obedience, 1 in Open B Obedience, 5 in Open A Obedience, 29 in Novice Obedience and 10 in Graduate Novice Obedience. There were 50 Senior Showmanship contestants, 60 Intermediate Showmanship, and 43 Jr. Showmanship. There were 24 entered in Rally-O III, and 31 in Rally-O II.

There were 25 contestants in Agility II, 23 in Agility III, and 48 in Agility 1.

It was fun to show with so many new people and interesting to see all the different breeds of dogs. It was also fun to watch others show and walk the fairgrounds in between turns.



New Club Seal Requirements

Starting this year there are new requirements for the Club Seal and a new process to complete the Club Summary in order for a club to receive their seal. Project Leaders and Volunteers must be Registered Volunteers

Reminder: Adults providing supervision to youth at a 4-H program; making decisions on behalf of the 4-H program; having access to private data of 4-H members or volunteers; and/or handling funds as part of 4-H must complete the volunteer screening process, be accepted, and enrolled as a Kansas 4-H volunteer.

Volunteer applications and renewals will now be completed through 4HOnline. We ask that all current volunteers complete their renewal by November 1.

Youth under the age of 18 no longer need to complete the volunteer screening process. (There are a few exceptions such as camp counselors.)
